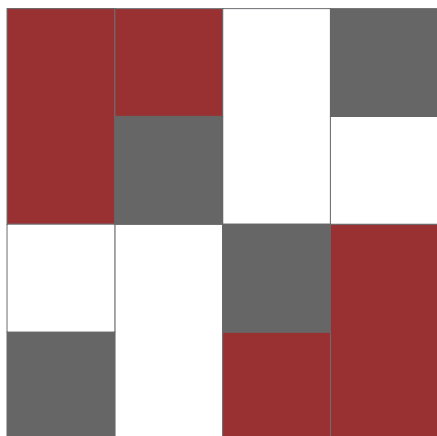


Turtle Block

6", 9", and 12" Block Reference Guide

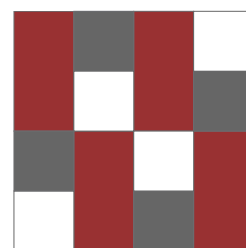
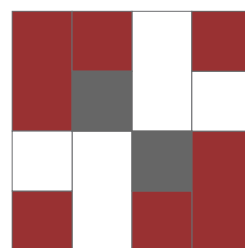
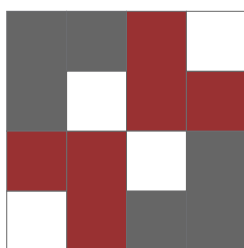
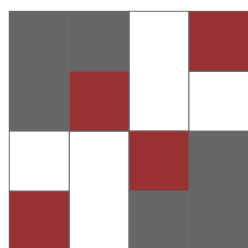
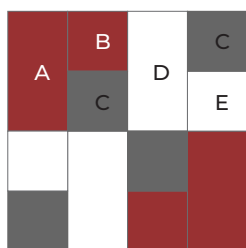


The Turtle block is based on a 2 x 2 grid structure.
The block is a 4-patch, made up of the following units:

- (2) red rectangles
- (2) red squares
- (4) gray squares
- (2) white rectangles
- (2) white squares

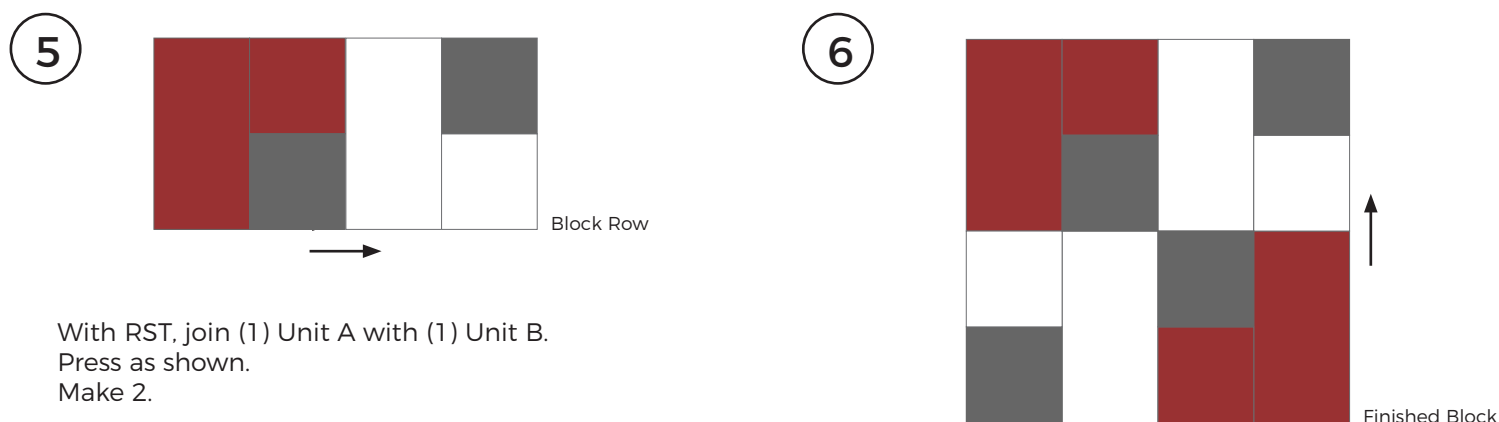
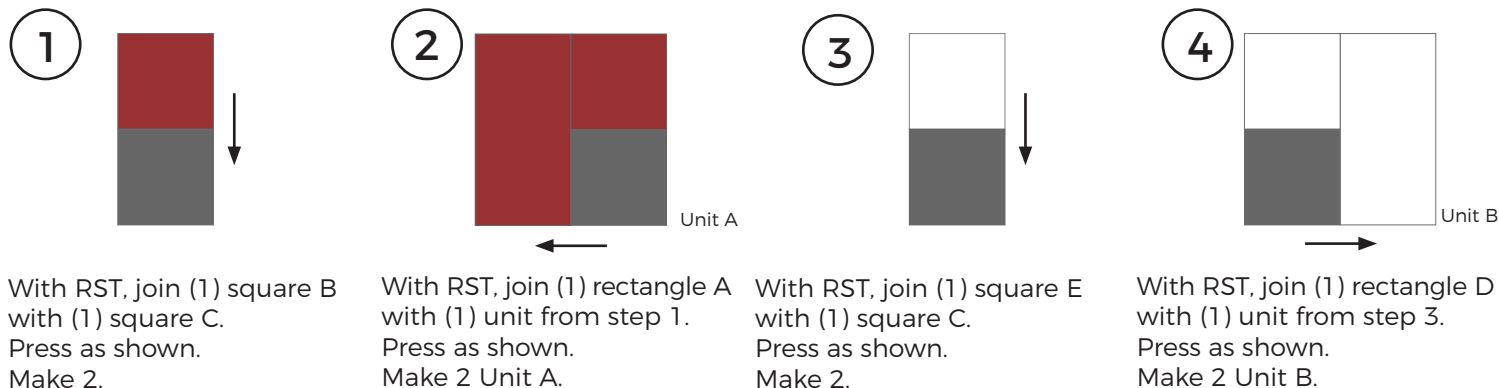

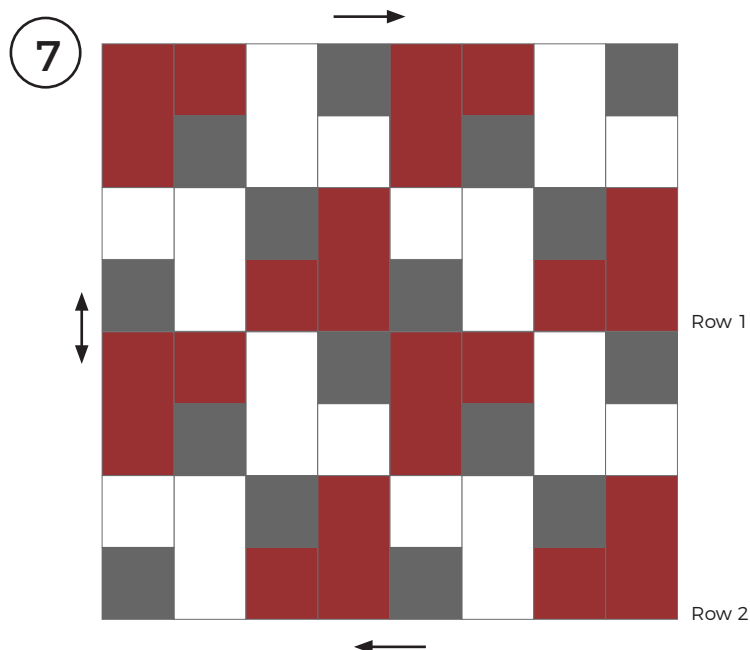

Cutting instructions are to make one block. If making multiple blocks, multiply the number of component pieces needed for each block by the number of blocks you plan to make to determine total number of block component pieces needed.

Turtle Block Assembly Guide



Repeat steps 1-6 to make 3 additional blocks.



Arrange the 4 quilt blocks into a 4-patch layout, turning blocks in an orientation you prefer.

With RST, join top two blocks into Row 1. Press to one side.
With RST, join bottom two blocks into Row 2. Press to opposite side.
With RST, join Row 1 and Row 2 to finish quilt top. Press to either side or open.
